the communities we serve. We are especially grateful for the chance each day to do work that makes a difference – to the individuals in our classes and training sessions, to the business and industry partners for the whom they work, to the families they love and for which they provide support, and to the communities where they live and work.

Columbus Tech students are accomplishing great things! Columbus Tech celebrated 1,386 graduates in Academic Year 2021, an increase of 8% over the prior year. With Columbus Tech's 98% job placement rate, those credentials position the 2021 graduates to increase their annual earnings by 9.4

million dollars over what they would have earned with a high school diploma alone, dollars that will be support families in our community and be reinvested in our community.

During 2021 the CTC team has been grateful to be safely on campus, in person, as well as online, to provide quality instruction and learning opportunities, and serve by supporting students to success. Columbus Tech opened its doors on December 1, 1961 with a total of 39 students, seven instructors, and eight program offerings. Today, CTC has an annual enrollment of nearly 5,000 students and offers more than 200 programs to meet both personal and workforce needs. In addition, CTC has an Adult Education division which offers high school equivalency credentials, job training, and English Language Learning. The Economic Development division provides continuing education courses and customized contract training.

While Columbus Tech has come a long way from its vocational school roots, it remains true to technical education while continuously evolving to meet workforce needs and serve its students well.

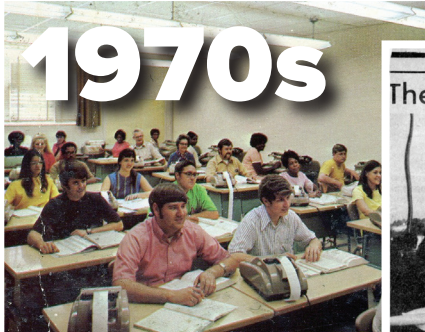

Vo-Tech Work Ahead of Schedule

Work on Columbus Vocational Technical School's 18th million, high technology addition is about a month and a half ahead of schedule.

"Most of the structure steel is erect, most of the concrete floor is poured and much of the roof is in the building," said project manager James Ferrigan of James C. Wolf Construction Co.

He estimated that 40 percent of the construction is complete.

"You can tell what shape it's going to be," Ferrigan said.

The 120,000-square-foot structure makes room for five high-tech teaching programs ranging from chemical technology to electronic engineering.

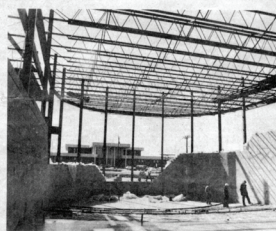
The building, across 4th Street from the current school, is scheduled to be finished by August 1983.

"They're coming along really well and simply because of the weather," said Columbus Tech Vice President G. Hartline.

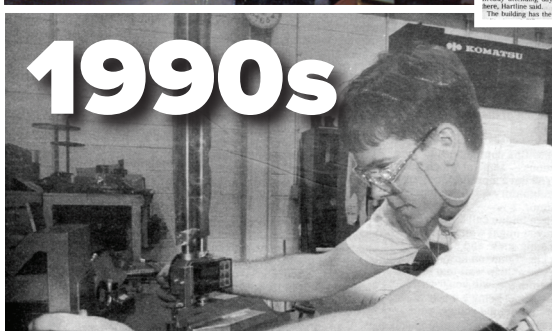
Fair and relatively warm weather has allowed workers many uninterrupted working days, Hartline said.

The addition will make room for about 50 new students adding to the 1,500 to 1,600 already attending day and night classes here, Hartline said.

My journey has not been easy, but with determination and hard work, the outcome will always be worth it.

My name is Angela Sevier and I have been attending CTC for two years.

I am 37 years old and originally from Chattanooga, Tennessee. I moved to Columbus three years ago and made the decision to enter the Valley Rescue Missions Women's Addiction Recovery Program. This decision allowed me to start on the path becoming the person I want to be. After years of feeling defeated, I started taking steps to improve my health and then I focused on my education. I knew by getting my high school diploma, not only would that further my opportunities but it would also allow me to lead by example when it came to encouraging my daughter and others about the value of an education. I successfully completed the recovery program in July of 2019 and began working at the Women's and Children's Center in September and then entered the Adult Education program.

CTC impacted my life by providing me with the foundation and tools, I needed to become a successful learner. I say "learner" because I will be able to apply these skills to my personal, professional, and educational goals. Not only did I learn how to receive and interpret the information, but I also learned how to retain and apply it. The knowledge that I have gained at CTC goes beyond the classroom walls and were not just "taught" but also experienced by working with fellow students and my instructors. When I started my journey at CTC, I was a nervous student who was scared and afraid to fail at life. After being at CTC, that frame of mind quickly went away, and I became a confident and courageous student that is excited to learn and grow.

My current goal is to complete my Associate degree in Human Resource Management and to continue working towards my Master's degree. It is my hope that I will be able to work in the business office at the Valley Rescue Mission when I graduate. I am excited to see what is to come.

I will be the first person in my family to graduate from college. I now believe in myself and am more confident than I have ever been. Achieving this goal has allowed me to prove to myself that I can do anything. Working towards my Associate degree, I am not worried or fearful of failure but confident that I will achieve this as well.

Besides being an adjunct and working in the bookstore, over the last 21 years I have also been a Programming Application Developer in IE. Currently, I serve as the Computer Support Lab, Math and Writing Lab Coordinator for the division of Academic Support.

After taking my courses, students knew the material and knew it well. I enjoyed knowing they retained the material I presented. Even though I'm no longer in the classroom, I still enjoying helping students and faculty. Often, I must put on my detective cap to solve a problem or resolve an issue across multiple departments, so I am still learning various areas as needed to assist students.

I believe that learning is a life-long process, so I want to teach students how to help themselves. My job is to help them learn or know where to go for help because technology is always changing! I know many people struggle with the decision to go back to school. I would tell them that CTC is unique because it offers both hands-on training with affordable tuition. With so many other colleges in the area, CTC's faculty cares about student success. CTC offers so much assistance to students struggling, academically, financially, or emotionally. At the time, my career aspiration was to become a physical therapist. I was forced to change my career path which was one of the best things to happen to me.

I was inspired to come to Columbus Tech after a conversation with my mother-in-law who told me that CTC has great programs from which to choose. Having a sister who completed the Radiology Technology program, she suggested that I give CTC a chance. She spoke so highly of the programs at CTC, and how it's an institution that caters to a nontraditional student, that I felt it would be a great opportunity for me to start over.

My time at CTC impacted my life in a major way. I was able to meet one of my mentors, Ken Lockhart, who was a big influence in my life. CTC PARTNERS WITH CEFGA TO LAUNCH CONSTRUCTION READY PROGRAM IN COLUMBUS



In August, Columbus Tech joined local leaders and officials along with several local businesses to announce the launch of the Columbus Construction Ready job training program.

To meet the city and state need for a skilled construction workforce, Construction Education Foundation of Georgia (CEFGA) CEFGA will offer a free Construction Ready Bootcamp on the campus of Columbus Tech beginning in October. Columbus Technical College president Martha Ann Todd praised the partnership with the mayor's office and CEFGA. "We see it as a great stepping stone," she told the construction leaders. "Hopefully you'll hire every one of these folks and you'll send them right back to us to gain more skills."



CTC SIGNS ARTICULATION AGREEMENT WITH TROY

In May, leaders from Columbus Tech and Troy University came together to clear the way for an easier path to educational success for students from both institutions. Fifty courses from Columbus Tech will now seamlessly transfer to Troy with the majority being in the general studies/core curriculum area.

Also included in the transfer agreement are program-specific courses related to pathways in the criminal justice, accounting, healthcare, and computer fields.



ADULT ED JOINS TRUTH SPRINGS TRADE SCHOOL'S WORKFORCE INITIATIVE EFFORT



In March, Columbus Technical College Adult Education division conducted an 8-week special course with Truth Spring Trade School.

Sixteen students of Columbus' North Highland community took their first step into a full year of training and job-readiness education known as Truth Spring Trade School. The first eight weeks were a combination of high school equivalency prep, digital literacy certification, soft-skill training, forklift safety training, OSHA Safety Training, and CPR provided by Columbus Tech.

One hundred percent (100%) of the students completed the Forklift Safety, Osha 10 Safety, and CPR Safety

certification programs. One hundred percent (100%) of the students completed Professional Development Certifications and 81% of those students increased their math, language, and reading scores from the first day of class.

Vice President of Adult Education at Columbus Technical College April Hopson said, "These last eight weeks have been simply amazing. I have seen all 16 students transform day by day and they are more confident and truly excited to see what they can accomplish next. I cannot wait to see what they will accomplish by December, and we are honored to be a part of this life-changing journey."

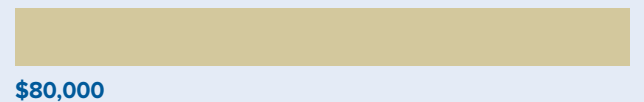

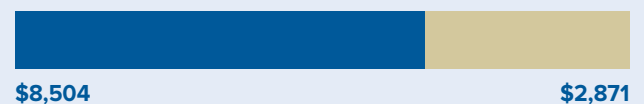
