Columbus Technical College has been providing the best in workforce preparedness and education for 57 years now and is showing no signs of slowing down. We are hitting new strides every day

from adding new programs to stellar accreditation reviews to community involvement, to increased graduation rates, national and state accolades, and more. Did you know Columbus Technical College boasts a job and/or continuing education placement rate of 100 percent and an in-field placement rate of nearly 90 percent? Talk about a great return on one's educational investment!

It's been a busy year fulfilling the mission of Columbus Technical College. Here are just a few highlights:

- We saw increases of 4.5 percent in "Unduplicated Graduates" and 3.9 percent in "Full-Time Equivalent" enrollment.
- We served nearly 700 students through Georgia's Dual Enrollment program. The students earned FREE college credit while still in high school.
- Culinary Arts students traveled to Germany to participate in a study abroad program. Money raised for the trip came from a fundraiser dinner

held in March. We hope you can join us and/or sponsor our next International Expedition dinner on March 14, 2019.

- The College and its Foundation distributed millions of dollars in financial assistance so our students could successfully continue their studies.
- The Adult Education program opened a new site in Talbot County. We are now serving 18 sites in six counties.

- Our Economic Development division provided customized training for 193 companies.

SERVICE

Boys & Girls Club Summer Camp

One big hit this year involved a newly-implemented summer camp for teenagers enrolled at Columbus area Boys & Girls Clubs. Twenty-four young people were on our campus two days a week for several weeks this summer. They enjoyed activities and hands-on learning experiences from building electrical motors to learning CPR and first aid to basic law enforcement forensics and self-defense techniques and even automotive maintenance skills. We hope to make the camp even bigger and better in the future!





The Adult Education program at Columbus Technical College continues to make great strides in providing services to our six-county service area. In the last year, Adult Ed helped more than 1,200 students earn their GED, hone their English language skills, learn about digital literacy and get ready for college. Some highlights of the last year include:

- Providing 18 sites across our service area. These facilities allow full access to Adult Education services and range from correctional institutions to community centers and more.
- Opening our Talbot County location.
- Moving to a 100% online test-taking process.
- Helping students who were unable to finish high school or earn their GED enroll in career-readiness college courses and GED classes at the same time.
- Participating in the first GED graduation ceremony at the Muscogee County Prison in over five years.



EDUCATION

Xavier Lewis - EAGLE Student

This year's Exceptional Adult Georgian in Literacy Education (EAGLE) student, Xavier Lewis, represented Columbus Technical College's Adult Education Department at the State competition. He placed in the Top 8 in Georgia and did an excellent job representing Columbus Technical College.

Since 1971, Mr. Lewis has been working on automobiles and supporting his family, which includes his wife, four children, ten grandchildren, and four great-grandchildren. He reads his Bible every day and loves to spend time fishing. He said that all of these years, it always felt like something was missing in his life so he decided to pursue his GED. He found that missing piece on June 20, 2017 when he walked across the stage at the Columbus Civic Center and received his high school diploma. Mr. Lewis says it felt like a cool breath of fresh air.

Mr. Lewis is now enrolled in the Automotive Technology Program at Columbus Technical College. He is 63 years young and remains an inspiration to all Adult Education students, proving that success is achievable at any age or at any stage of life.

The Economic Development division of Columbus Technical College provides customized training for companies and individuals as well as continuing education and personal development opportunities. Economic Development works closely with industries in our service area to ensure they get the best workforce development training available. They also have close relationships with school districts to provide job-ready learning opportunities.

Summer CMS

Thirty-one high school students graduated from the summer Certified Manufacturing Specialist (CMS) program in August meaning they already have a college-level technical certificate of credit before even finishing high school. A highlight of the summer was a tour of the KIA plant in West Point, Georgia. Students had the opportunity to observe automotive robotic welding, stamping, painting and assembly processes. The facility produces over 350,000 vehicles each year.

As part of their class, a panel of speakers representing some of Columbus Technical

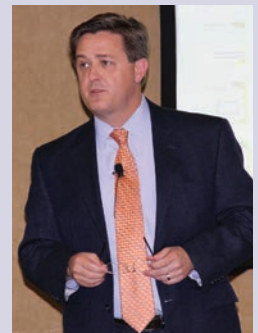

Georgia Department of Labor Commissioner Mark Butler came to campus this summer to talk about economic development. A group of high school students is all smiles after completing the CMS (Certified Manufacturing Specialist) program at Columbus Technical College. These students will be armed with real-life experience and a certification when they graduate.



College's partnering companies spoke to students about resume writing, interview etiquette, the employee selection process, and employer expectations. Another highlight of the program was mock interviews. The students dressed professionally, prepared resumes, and conducted themselves as they would for an actual job interview. They were interviewed by Columbus Technical College deans, vice presidents, and instructors. Afterward, students were given one-on-one advice as to how they might improve their skills.

WorkKeys® Testing

To provide additional training for their team members, a number of area employers have taken advantage of WorkKeys® assessments – a test for organizations that places an emphasis on the National Career Readiness Certificate. This credential verifies that the person assessed has foundational workplace skills in applied math, graphic literacy, and workplace documents. Organizations use the WorkKeys® results as a foundation from which to build a customized training program or as a means of making clients more attractive to employers.

Other Accomplishments

- Saved \$1,394,339.82 for 33 companies through the GA Retraining Tax Credit program
- Developed a customized Change Leadership program for the Georgia Department of Drivers Services and delivered to 225 of their middle managers around the state
- Proctored 3,472 professional certification/licensure exams
- Provided CPR, First Aid, Basic Life Support, and other American Heart Association certifications to 522 students



2018 GOAL Student of the Year - Trey Brown



Each year the college names its GOAL (Georgia Occupational Award of Leadership) winner. This student is nominated by his or her instructor based on academic excellence and exemplary character. Columbus Technical College's GOAL student for 2018 was Trey Brown from our respiratory care technology program. Not only did he win at the college level but Trey was named the first

The Rick Perkins/Tim Justice Award recognizes the College's outstanding technical education instructor of the year. The 2018 winner was chemistry instructor/science department chair, Alicia Anderson. Funds raised by various events put on by the students, including our Culinary Expedition in March, helped offset some of the cost of the trip.



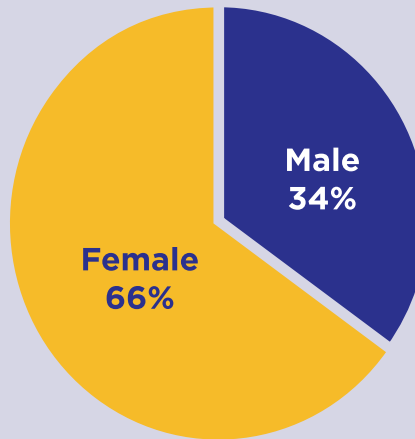
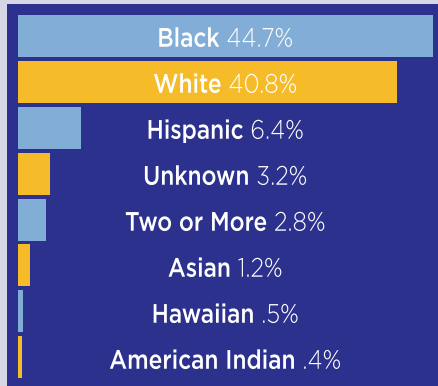

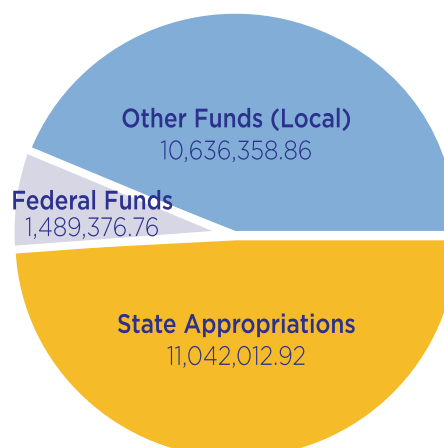

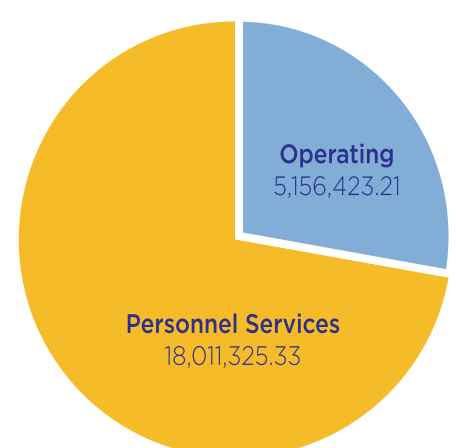
2018 Revenue

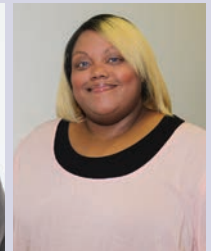

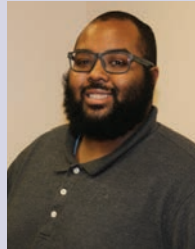
